The Housing Challenge

My partner and I had been wanting to move out for some time as we lived over 30 mins apart in our family homes and like to spend a lot of time together. We were struggling to find rentals that were affordable and worth the price being offered. My partner and I had never lived together before and we were very keen to make the next step in our relationship when we eventually found the right place for us.

If we didn't find the Elevate by Foundation Housing program, we would just have continued looking and either settled for something less in quality and convenience, but for a higher price, or given up our search altogether.

When we were unsuccessful with our first application, Jason kindly offered other options and prioritised us, which meant a lot. My partner and I would like to thank Elevate housing for making this all happen. We have recommended Elevate to just about every man and his dog.
